Back in the **big time** for 2018

WELLINGBOROUCH Colf Club will be represented on the 2018 Men's European Tour after club pro Ryan Evans secured his card by finishing eighth on the 2017 Challenge Tour Order of Merit. Wellingborough Colf Club Magazine chatted with Evans about his year, and looked ahead to the new season.

How do you reflect on the 2017 Challenge Tour?

I went to the US for winter practice, and worked hard hitting balls for nine days. I wasn't well in Kenya and almost pulled out. But everything came together in Turkey, when I played almost faultless golf. I only hit one bad shot, I holed almost everything I looked at and when that happens you are going to be there or thereabouts.

How did winning the Turkish Open feel?

It was surprising, but wasn't surprising. I didn't expect to win the second event of the year. But when you see the highlights of the final round, there is no massive fist pump (pictured) - it wasn't until a few weeks later when it hit home.

Your results dropped off after then. Why?

I went out expecting to win again, but then, all of sudden, I started playing really badly. I finished 15th on a wide course in Portugal, but I hit a lot of bad shots and would have missed the cut if it hadn't been for my short game. But once I played on tighter courses, I couldn't get it round. I shot 84 in Scotland - on a 12-hour train journey home, I thought 'where has my game

gone?'. It was a harsh and horrible feeling.

What turned it around?

My next event was in Sardinia. I'm glad it was there because it was quite open and I scraped the cut. I still finished one from last, but it was just a relief to make the cut.

How much difference did a new caddie make?

I was approached by Ryan Sander, who had just split with his player Joel Girrbach, who won earlier in the year in Switzerland. We worked together in France as a trial and we finished third, which came from nowhere. It was tight in places so I had to hit it well, which I did, I putted well, the short game was great and he was really good in getting me round. So we stayed together for the rest of the year.

Are you working with him again this season?

Yes, hopefully we will continue where we left off. We get on well, but I quite like the fact that we don't spend that much time together off the course - we both have different interests outside of golf.

WGM: What do you take from playing on the What do you need to do to keep your card? 2016 European Tour?

Ryan Evans: I know what I have to do. Last time, I made a few swing changes ahead of the year in a bid to make myself really good and really solid, but I actually got worse. Everyone plays the game differently, no-one has the perfect golf swing, the perfect short game or the perfect putting stroke it's all about scoring. I've worked hard on what I'm good at, and will play how I play this season.

How did you feel on Tour last time?

I was guite excited, but I was scared as well - I'd grown up watching this guys on TV, and suddenly I was in with them, asking the guestion 'should I be here?'. I was unsure of what I was getting in, and on occasions I wouldn't find out if I was playing in an event until the Monday beforehand, so I didn't have a solid schedule. I always play better when I have a run of four or five tournaments in a row. But. I couldn't seem to get into a flow.

Are you going to play in more events in 2018?

It's wrong to say I didn't have a good crack at it in 2016, because I had 21 events, but they were some of the smaller events, with a few exceptions. But now with a better category, I will get most of the Rolex Series, hopefully the British Masters because it would be great to play Wentworth and other good ones.

What positives do you draw on from 2016?

I had a good spell from the Scottish Open, when I got in very late but had a great draw (alongside Henrik Stenson and Martin Kaymer in round one and then Patrick Reed) and that spurred me on could fall to play well in the Open, then to Thailand. I had a great result in the Czech, played well in Denmark, I'm but by the end of the season I'd left myself too much looking to do. It would have been nice to get off to that forward hot start early and try to push on towards the end. to it.

It's a Ryder Cup year, so players will be chasing Ryder Cup points - I'm hoping that doesn't backfire for me this year. There will be the occasional event I probably won't get into, like Dubai or Abu Dhabi, which I would love to play. The seventh person on the 2016 Challenge Tour Order of Merit played at Wentworth in 2017. I finished eighth, which was first reserve. But you never know with injuries.

What is your schedule?

I've entered everything, but if I get in some events I will not play others. For example, I played in Hong Kong and Australia, and I'm in the South Africa Open in January, but I probably won't get in Abu Dhabi, Dubai or Malaysia, so that's the rest of the month off. Then it's Perth, Oman, Qatar, South Africa again, India and the Philippines, which is almost six on the spin with one week off. Then around the Masters time I will get some time off, until it starts getting busy in May, with Wentworth (hopefully), Italy, Austria and then three Rolex Series events in France. Ireland and Scotland. which have the bigger prize funds.

How many events do you think you will play?

I think I will play around 27 competitions, but if I get into some of the bigger tournaments, I may have to sacrifice some events. To keep my card, I will need to get to £400,000, which sounds good, but it means I have to

perform in those bigger events otherwise I behind.

ellingborough pro Ryan Evans: "It's great to be back on the European Tourafter a good year. I've earned the right to be there through the Challenge Tour. I just need to prove that I'm good enough to stay there. Wellingborough have been loyal to me, they have looked after me eversince i joined, and i am looking forward to representing the Club on the European Tour in 2018^p

From Railway Carriage to Georgian Grandeur

WITH Wellingborough Golf Club celebrating it's 125th anniversary in 2018, member David Wilson investigates all the significant changes that have occured at the club over the last century and a quarter. In the first of 12 monthly articles, he looks at the golf courses over the years.

IN November 1893, a meeting was held which agreed to set up a golf club in Wellingborough.

Twenty nine men were there - a doctor, a dentist, schoolmasters, brewers, solicitors, a wine merchant and a clergyman.

Mrs. Thompson let them have three fields for golf at Nest Farm (now the Finedon Road Industrial Estate) for $\pounds 2$ a year.

Annual subscriptions were a guinea (\pounds 1.05) for men and 10s 6d ($52^{1/2}p$) for ladies, with an entrance fee of 10s 6d. Juniors were encouraged with reduced fees.

The rules were drawn up at The Hind Hotel and Old Tom Morris was appointed course architect.

The first 18-hole competition for men was played on March 29th, 1894 with an entrance fee of 6d $(2\frac{1}{2}p)$ and the prize was a golf club. Ladies played nine holes in the afternoon and members' handicaps ranged from 13 to 50.

Old Tom was pleased to see hazards like railway tracks, whins, hedges, briars and a dry ditch in play. The facilities at the Nest Lane course were minimal; first a 'hovel' at the farm, then an old railway carriage and finally, in 1910, a 'pavilion' costing £150.

By 1922, the nine-hole course had become congested so members voted by 37 to 20 to move to a new three-field site at the old Wellingborough waterworks.

Nine holes were made with the intention of buying more land, called 'Bumphrey', which lay between the roads from Wellingborough to Sywell and

Wellingborough to Hardwick.



Wellingborough Golf Club Company was formed to manage the fundraising and to plan the facilities needed on the new site, which was opened on November 22nd, 1923.

Twenty five years later, WGC bought the land. This 'Old Course' site can still be imagined by referring to the names of the roads that now cover it - Gleneagles, Wentworth, Cotton, and Jacklin.

In 1968, thanks to unrelenting negotiations, the Club sold the Old Course and bought land at Harrowden which was to become, in 1975, our present home.

An additional deal enabled WGC to buy Harrowden Hall itself from its owner Mr. Macdonald Buchanan to use as the clubhouse.

The course was re-designed to bring the first tee and 18th green to the end of the main garden. Now Wellingborough had 18 holes, magnificent gardens, a swimming pool, cottages, a machinery

yard and a course that would become one of the finest in the Midlands.
