In a 36-hole event that sees the top county pros join forces with the best county amateurs, the duo posted a bogey-free 65 in the morning betterball.

A strong start to their afternoon foursomes enabled Lilly and Davis, who won the County Championship in 2011, to move clear of the field on 135.

Glenn Harris and Ricky Sanders (pictured) won the NGL Seniors Pairs Open on their own course at Wellingborough after beating three pairs on countback with 41 points.

Fellow home club members Charlie Higgins and Martyn Amis took second spot ahead of club-mates Kevin Turner and Steve Crawley, who won the nearest the pin prize on the fourth hole.

With 40 golfers representing 11 different clubs taking part, Cold Ashby duo Dennis Mathers and Robin Coles had to be content with fourth place.

Wellingborough completed a gross and net double in the Ladies NGL Senior Championship as Carol Gibbs and Ida Jane Huggins grabbed the pole positions at Silverstone GC.

Gibbs needed a birdie on the 18th in a gross 80 to snatch a one shot victory from club-mate Mary MacLaren, with fellow member Gill Snelson fourth.

Huggins, who finished fifth in the gross, carded seven pars in a net 71 as she nudged one stroke ahead of two players in the net competition.

Evans looking to make the most of home comforts

RYAN Evans is hopeful of being in action twice in the UK this month on the European Tour as the Wellingborough pro chases valuable points in a bid to retain his card for 2019.

Evans is definitely playing in the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship Kingsbarns, Carnoustie and on the Old Course at St. Andrews in early October, and has put his name down to compete in the Sky Sports British Masters at Walton Heath GC a week later.

Needing to finish in the top 110 to guarantee more starts on the main tour for next season, the former Wellingborough club champion currently lies 149th in the standings.

Fellow Club pro Kyson Lloyd missed out on a place in the second stage of European Tour qualifying after finishing 40th in the opening tournament at Frilford Heath GC. He carded five birdies in a 72 on day one, added 77 on the next day, before bouncing back with a bogey-free 70 in the penultimate round.

Needing a strong finish to progress through to Spain next month, Lloyd birdied all three par five holes on the last day, but could only pick up one more stroke as a round of 72 left him four adrift of qualification.

Meghan MacLaren, meanwhile, made her second appearance in a major tournament this year as she took part in the Evian Championship in France.

After making the cut in the British Open a few weeks earlier, the Wellingborough pro was unable to repeat the feat as rounds of 77 and 73 meant she missed the cut.

The 24-year-old, who also missed out on the weekend in the French Open the previous week, found better form in the Estrella Damm Ladies Open at Terramar GC later in the month.

After opening with a 72, MacLaren posted three birdies and an eagle in a four-hole run on the back nine in a second round 66, before adding scores of 68 and 71 over the weekend to finish in 28th spot.

Harrowden Hall: The War Years and beyond

WITH Wellingborough Golf Club celebrating it's 125th anniversary in 2018, member David Wilson investigates all the significant changes that have occured at the Club. In the latest monthly article, he looks more closely at how the Golf Club coped during the Second World War, and then attempted to slowly rebuild from 1945 onwards.

the Annual Dance had to be cancelled and all cup in the creation of a bike shed. competitions were held over!

which limited the club to five gallons a month for Eastfield Park. ALL PURPOSES.

There was also a serious shortage of beer and efforts were made to contact several different breweries to safeguard supplies.

Gin, however, had accumulated behind the bar and had to be sold off for £1 a bottle while other prices were increased

Competitions were held regularly to provide funds particularly for the Red Cross and the Spitfire Fund, while green fees were reduced to $1/6d (7\frac{1}{2}p)$ for the Armed Forces.

But the club was more troubled by the suggestion that the second and third fairways should be ploughed up for farming; remember WGC was plaving on the Bushfields Course at this time.

Initially fencing off the course from the sheep made it too costly but in 1943 they were ploughed for crops only to be re-seeded two years later.

There was a little compensation and a reduction in rent for the inconvenience.

> He ran a taxi service to the Golf Club and back, with 'picking up' places at agreed points along the route, on Saturday afternoons and Sunday morninas.

> Ever generous, the Club rewarded the drivers with a drink on Sunday morning.

> The war took its toll of members. In 1939. Membership was 125 men and 65 ladies but in 1945 it was down to 84 men and 49 ladies.

> After the war, Wellingborough was in for considerable expansion with new estates. schools, colleges and other facilities.

> For the Golf Club, it was time for 'an improvement fund' and a new bar, new furniture, new crockery and towels were ordered.

> On the course, an appeal fund was launched for water to be laid to the greens - all completed and paid for by 1950.

> Under the strong Presidency of Stan Collier, the Club found its feet again: cattle were not allowed on the course (as requested by the farmer) and neither were the sheep.

> Membership began to increase and now cost in modern terms £4.75 for men and £3.15 for ladies - schoolboys continuing to pay 521/2p.

> By 1950, the Club's annual income had risen to around £740 (from £366 in 1945).

> At the end of 1945. Arthur Husk was appointed assistant to George Craddock, whose health was failing, at £3 a week.

> The Craddocks were highly regarded by the Club and received bonuses every year.

> The men's Spring weekends away on the east coast were well supported - that in April 1948 was at Sheringham and cost £2.25 a head.
