Tiger roars to County Singles KO success

WELLINGBOROUGH member Tiger Adams clinched the last NGL title of 2018 with a comprehensive victory in the County Matchplay Scratch Singles Final.

Competing against Northants County's Owen Watts in the showpiece match at Northampton GC, the 19-year-old found his best form as he romped to a 5&4 win.

In a Knockout event for the best 16 players in the NGL Men's Strokeplay Championships, Adams took his first stride towards the final by beating Jordan Darnell (Kettering) on the 18th hole in his opening tie.

After gaining a quarter-final walkover win, the teenager, who finished sixth in the County Strokeplay Championships in June, booked his spot in the final by defeating Luis Witherall (Northants County) on the last hole.

Watts qualified for the final after narrow wins over Jack Brown (County), Ian Wicks (Peterborough Milton) and Brendon Moss (Collingtree).



Tap-Ins

OUTGOING Captain Martin Wall led the well-wishers for George Khaw (Club), Sally McKeown (Ladies), Peter Gannon (Seniors) and Michael Hinds (Juniors) as they embark on their years as the respective 2019 Captains at Wellingborough.

MICHAEL Billson's three year tenure as Club President came to an end in November. He indicated he would like to continue in the role, which was then confirmed at the Wellingborough AGM.

NIGEL Grimmitt became the new Junior Organiser at the Wellingborough AGM, while Andrew Gallagher and Roy Pouncey were nominated to join the new Captain's Committee.

FOUR Butlers served up a winning display in the November Am-Am Stableford as Roger, Sue, William and Wendy Butler delivered the goods with 90 points.

LADIES Scratch Team winning golfer Ashleigh Critchley finished ninth in the Telegraph Vitality Junior Golf Championship as she battled difficult weather conditions at PGA Catalunya in Spain.

RYAN Evans picked up some prize money on the 2019 European Tour in late November as he made the cut in the Australian PGA Championship. The Club pro will be playing on the 2019 Challenge Tour.

THE name of the winner might not have matched the season in the first round of the Seniors Lonsdale Series, but Brian Summers won't mind after he clinched the November comp on 37 points.

WELLINGBOROUGH received praise from the NGL after being the host venue for the men's first team matches over the last two years. The County won the Anglian League in 2018.

Golf's New Rules: Summary of changes

THE R&A and the USGA conducted an extensive review of the rules of golf, before finalising the process earlier this year by announcing a collection of new rules that will come into force from the start of 2019. For full details, visit www.rules.golf, but here is a two-page guide of the main changes.



- Off the green, if you move your ball while looking for it, or accidentally stand on it or kick it while searching, there is no penalty and you must replace it, not drop it.
- On the putting green, accidentally causing your ball to move is no longer a penalty – and it should be returned to its original position.
- It's no longer a penalty if your ball is accidentally deflected off an opponent, caddie, yourself or any equipment and the ball is played as it lies.
- A double hit is no longer a penalty, if done accidentally.
- When putting on the green, there is no penalty if you hit a flagstick whether attended (pictured above) or not.
- You can now repair most marks/damage on the putting green, apart from aeration holes and natural surface imperfections.
- When on a putting green, there is no penalty if you touch the 'line of play' (not 'line of putt').
- If your ball on the green has already been marked, cleaned and replaced - and then moves, it must be replaced to its original spot, regardless of what caused it to move.
- If you haven't yet marked your ball, and it moves, then you play it from where it lies.
- A caddie no longer needs permission from the player to lift and mark their player's ball. The caddie can only replace the ball if he/she was the one to mark it originally.
- Searching for a lost ball is now three minutes.
- The ball must be dropped from knee height and not touch you as it is being dropped.
- There will be a specific area that the ball must come to rest in, ie one club length or two. If the ball fails to come to rest in this area then it will be placed after two drop attempts.
- Measuring relief is done by using your longest club, but not your putter.
- 'Through the green' is called 'the general area'.

● A plugged/embedded ball can now be dropped without penalty anywhere on the course (outside of a penalty area/hazard), but a club's local rules can be imposed to restrict this to fairway height grass areas only. If no local rule in place, then it is any general area.
Wellingborough Golf Club will not be imposing a local rule.

Golf's New Rules: Stroke and Distance



A new local rule will provide an alternative to stroke and distance relief for a ball that is lost outside a penalty area or out of bounds. This new Local Rule will be available beginning of January 1st, 2019.

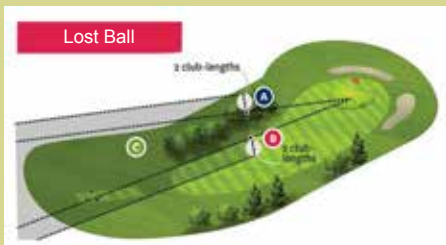
If the Local Rule is in effect, you can still take stroke-and-distance relief, but you will now have the option that comes with a penalty of two strokes:

A DETERMINE SPOT where your ball went out of bounds (top diagram) or is likely to be lost (bottom diagram).

B FIND NEAREST FAIRWAY EDGE no closer to the hole.

C DROP YOUR BALL IN SHADED AREA as defined on one side by a line from the hole through point A and on the other side by a line from the hole through point B, and not nearer the hole. The relief area is extended on both sides by two club lengths.

The Local Rule is not intended for higher levels of play, such as pro or elite amateur level events.



- You can replace/substitute your golf ball any time you are taking a drop whether a free drop or a penalty drop.
- All hazards are now called 'penalty areas' but yellow and red markings can still be used. Other areas around the course to be avoided can be deemed 'penalty areas' by the course committee, eg plant borders, pond behind the eighth green, etc.
- Relief can no longer be taken on the green side of a lateral water hazard/red marked penalty area.
- You are now allowed to ground your club and remove loose impediments in a 'penalty area' excluding bunkers.
- You can now move loose impediments in a bunker, but you are still not allowed to ground your club in a bunker prior to making either your stroke or practice swing
- If you are unable to play your ball in the bunker you may take a two-shot penalty drop outside of the bunker, going back in line from the ball and the pin
- You can replace your golf ball if it has become cut or cracked - you do not have to tell your playing partner that you are doing this.
- You may continue to use a damaged club during a round of golf.
- You cannot replace a club if you or your caddie caused the damage in anger.
- Digital Measuring Devices can now be used at all times, unless a local rule is in place prohibiting their use.
- Using a caddie to help you line up on any shot is now prohibited.
- Players are now allowed no more than 40 seconds to play a shot.
- Playing out of turn, in any format, is encouraged, to help speed up play - in matchplay, this is by agreement between the players.
- You no longer need to inform your playing partner, regardless of the competition format, if you are planning on lifting your golf ball, whether to inspect for damage, to see if it is embedded or to identify your ball.
- You can no longer be penalised after the event if you have been found to make a decision on taking a drop that was not 100% accurate. Your best judgement, at the time, is deemed sufficient.

Challenge Tour return for Ryan in 2019

RYAN Evans (pictured) will need to concentrate on the European Challenge Tour next year after missing out on a full European Tour card in the final stage of Q School.

The Wellingborough pro, who played in the US Open and finished 148th in the main tour rankings this season, gave himself hope of securing one of 27 cards in final qualifying in Spain as he made the cut with scores of 67, 71, 73 and 68.

Although Evans came through qualifying a few years ago with low scores on the last two days, he couldn't repeat the trick this time as he compiled closing rounds of 72 and 69 to finish eight shots adrift.

Evans tweeted: "2018 European Tour season over!! Gave it one last go at final stage Q School but my whole game wasn't at the races. Finish -8 for 6 rounds. Long way off getting my card back. Time for some rest now before we go again!!"



MacLaren completes rookie year on LET

MEGHAN MacLaren (pictured right) ended another successful season on a high as she finished 14th in the Andalucia Costa del Sol Open at La Quinta GC in Spain.

The Wellingborough pro, who won the New South Wales Open towards the start of the year, carded five birdies in an opening score of 70 and then added a 74 to make the cut.

MacLaren bagged a couple of birdie two's in a third round 70 to stay in contention for a good finish, before she completed her year in style with a birdie on the 18th hole in a final round of 70.

After winning the 2017 Access Series, the 24-year-old finished 22nd in her first full year on the main European Tour as British Open champion Georgia Hall clinched the Order of Merit.

Fellow Club pro Kyson Lloyd, meanwhile, finished 133rd on the 2018 EuroPro Tour Order of Merit as he was unable to build on a solid start to the season when he made the cut in two of his opening four events.

Good Old Days: Maids, bulls & high heels

WITH Wellingborough Golf Club celebrating its 125th anniversary in 2018, member David Wilson investigates all the significant changes that have occurred at the Club. In the final monthly article, he looks at some more quirky issues and situations that the Club has needed to deal with over the years.

BACK in the day, the Club was doing well! An early Annual Balance Sheet reported that the 'financial position of the Club must be considered satisfactory when it is remembered that nearly £16 has been spent on new lockers, rules, pavilion and grass cutting.' How times change!

Most new societies, clubs and groups go through difficult times in the early days and it is members' generosity that sees them through.

Wellingborough Golf Club's minutes for July 1894 recorded; 'thanks to Dr Platt for lending a lawnmower, Mr Hope for giving a lawnmower and Mr Dulle for giving leaf mould for the greens.'

In August 1898, 'Mr Hope reported that the grass on the links had been cut by machine but that in order to put it in good condition sheep should be put on to keep the grass down.' Consequently, £50 was spent on buying sheep.

In April 1887, 'Mr Hope offered to send up a maid on Thursdays to prepare refreshments for members.'

Problems, Problems... How do you encourage members to turn up to the Club AGMs? In 1898, they were offered a Tripe Supper.

More problems in November 1922 - Miss Kenyon proposed that Mr Walters be asked to keep his bull under restraint and, in 1934, Mr Dack (the farmer who owned the land) agreed to keep all cows and horses off the course for £25 per annum.

A problem in the clubhouse was solved in 1921 by agreeing that a fine of 2p be paid by any member who leaves the door open and the secretary was asked to put up a notice asking members not to wear high heeled shoes.

More course problems in October 1977. 'Members have again experienced trouble and annoyance with the areas of rough left for hay-making. This will not occur again; pledged the Captain.'

Changes! Some of those early members were not afraid of change.

In 1914, the ladies passed a resolution that a silver spoon should be played for on a medal day instead of a button!

But you must not press too hard nor go too far. In 1959, a request by the ladies to be allowed to play on the course on Saturdays after 2.30pm (how DARE they?!) was defeated by 46 votes to 16, with one spoilt paper.

'We shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields...' The Club's contribution in August 1940 was to place a roller in the middle of the second fairway to prevent enemy aircraft landing.

Go Compare! Bar prices in 1961: Beer 8½p pint; whisky 10p; gin 8½p; sherry 9p; tea, toast & two eggs 15p. A packet of crisps was 1p; now it's 22p.

But Wellingborough Golf Club's finest hour must have been in the 1980s when it warranted an article in The Sun newspaper, which was repeated on national news channels.
