Winner on the Ladies European Tour - TWICE!

WELLINGBOROUGH Golf Club professional Meghan MacLaren recorded her second victory on the Ladies European Tour as she retained her Women's New South Wales Open in Australia last month. After returning to the UK, our Meg nipped down to Harrowden Hall to meet up with Wellingborough Golf Club Magazine to chat about her latest success.



How did it feel to win the Women's New South Wales Open again?

Meghan MacLaren: It was pretty amazing. It's one of those things that doesn't quite sink in, whilst it's happening. The reason I was so proud is that you can play well without winning - people can go five, ten year spells without winning. There are so many moments that happen when you are in contention, so to know that I'd played well and won twice is the most satisfying part of it.

What was your approach as defending champ?

I had the same situation as an amateur, with the British Strokeplay Championships. I was not trying to defend anything because the way I won last year wasn't through trying to defend anything, I just went out and did my own thing - I tried to approach it that way. There were more people talking to me, and asking questions, but that's a nice thing because they want to know what you think, how the course is, how your game is, so it elevates you a little bit. It helped that it wasn't the same course but it was completely different.

Leading going into the final round, how did you feel?

I'd been playing so well going into the event, and into the final round, so it's hard not to think that it's going to be comfortable. Even though I know how hard golf is, you hope that it will carry on like that. But it didn't. Conditions were a lot tougher on the final day, which made it harder for me to carry on the way I had all week.

What happened in the last round?

It wasn't quite going to plan. There was a moment on the front nine when I could have gone three ahead of the two girls I was playing with, it felt like that could have been a nail in their coffin. But I missed a short putt, and then made bogey on the next, and you could see that it spurred on the others - a lot of it is psychological in golf.

How did the game plan change?

Heading into the back nine, I was clinging on a bit. I wasn't playing badly, but I kept having to make up-and-downs to make par, rather than having comfortable birdie chances. I made bogey on 13, when one of the girls made birdie, so three of us were tied for the lead. I didn't know what was going on with the other groups. I made a couple of really good pars as conditions were getting harder, and I told myself 'I've got enough to out grind the other two'. I was through the toughest part and felt as long as I could find a way of getting pars, I would be fine. But I didn't know what was happening in front.

Did you see any scoreboards?

There was one scoreboard coming around, but it wasn't always there. Because we'd gone backwards, if someone had played well, there's every chance they could be in the lead.

What happened on the 16th tee?

I was one up on the other two when I walked to the 16th tee but I needed to know what was going on because I thought I was in the lead, but I might not be. I saw a friend, who said another girl had just eagled the 16th to go two shots clear of me.

How did that affect your mind set?

I don't know if that focussed me a little more. I knew I still had three holes to go, so I didn't have to force anything.

After finding the 16th fairway, what did you do?

I had quite a long time to wait before hitting my second - it wasn't an easy shot, but I'd had a similar one the day before, a big cut with a three wood around the trees. Because it was such a hard shot, it made me focus more. I was thrilled when I hit it but I couldn't see the green. My caddie saw it come down and he said it was fine. When I got up there, it was six feet away!

How proud were you of that shot?

You'd like to think that you'd play the same shot whatever the situation, but I'd been waiting the whole round for something to happen. I produced when I really needed it. To make eagle was a bonus.

Did you think you were leading then?

I was quite happy to have a tap-in par on 17. I then saw a scoreboard, and my name was at the top of the leaderboard, but I wasn't sure if it had been updated. I saw my friend, who confirmed that the other girl had double bogeyed the 18th.

How did you feel?

Within half an hour, I'd gone from 'this has maybe gone' to 'as long as I don't do anything stupid on 18, it's mine'. But the tee shot on the 18th was really horrible.

How did you play the last hole?

I hit it a bit right, but it was fine. It was a surreal moment - you feel as if it as an out-of-body experience watching yourself. Once I hit my approach shot to 12 feet onto the green, I knew it was mine. It wasn't an easy putt, but I knew I wasn't going to do anything crazy. I was delighted when the birdie putt dropped (pictured).

How pleasing was it to finish in the top 10 in South Africa the next week?

It was 42 hours travelling straight from Australia to South Africa. I had to pull out of the Pro-Am because I felt horrendous, so I basically played the first round blind. I could have gone home, but there was an additional motivation to see if I could get into contention again when I wasn't feeling great. So that spurred me on. I didn't play well all week, but to get myself into position again, made me learn something completely different but equally as positive as the week before.

What does this mean for the rest of your season?

I'm now in the British Open and the Evian. I will try and qualify for the US Open.

And the Solheim Cup, is that a target?

I'm not 100% sure how to get into the Solheim Cup team - I just know I need to play well. There is a Solheim Cup points total, and also the World Rankings, and there are a lot of strong Europeans in there. I have the bonus of knowing that I played well at Gleneagles in the 2018 European Championships. So I hope to get in automatically, or earn a Captain's pick. But, yes, it's a target.

Stop watching Forest play.






